Younger children (under 10 years old) Pre-teens (10 to 12 years old) Adolescents (13+ years old)




Explaining Our Work

Define what the adult industry is.

Use analogies or comparisons.

Highlight the skills and creativity.

Validate other's opinions.

Language that your children can understand

Privacy and Safety



Address how you protect your privacy and ensure your safety in your work within the adult industry.



Reassure your children that you take precautions to maintain personal boundaries and keep information about your work private.



Explain the importance of discretion and confidentiality in discussing your work outside the family.



Encourage your children to come to you with any questions or concerns they may have about privacy or safety.

Handling External Reactions

Discuss strategies for addressing questions or comments from other parents, family members, or children's peers about your work in the adult industry.

 Offer advice on how to navigate potential misunderstandings or judgments about your work

Encourage open communication and education about the adult industry to help others understand your perspective and choices.

Provide resources or information that other parents can use to educate themselves and their children about diversity and different types of work

Supporting Our Children

Offer ongoing support and reassurance to our children as they process and understand our work. Encourage open dialogue and continue the conversation as our children grow and develop.
